
## PRESIDENT'S PEN

# COUNCIL SHORTS

There is no Council Meeting in January, but that does not mean that nothing has been happening. There still have been some interesting things to keep people busy.

## **Stray Animals**

There has been an absolute menagerie of animals wandering the streets of Cuballing. We have had people with missing ducks, sheep that have demonstrated a talent for escaping and more than a couple of dogs seeing the sights around town. We have even had a couple of sheep, a peacock and a pea hen that have apparently materialised from nowhere.

There is a serious side to this. Cats and dogs must be registered and microchipped. If dogs or cats owners cannot be identified there is a real chance that these animals could be rehomed or euthanised.

Dogs escaping and exploring the town may seem harmless. However, when the dog is collected by the Shire there is a seizure fee of at least \$50, daily poundage of \$20. Dogs wandering without a leash can attract a fine of \$200, if they wander into someone's property \$200, and if they chase someone's sheep, another \$200. And the fines are cumulative. If you have 2 dogs, the fines are per dog. It can get very expensive very quickly. If they attack livestock or bite a child the consequences do not bear thinking about. Please keep your dogs contained.

We recently had a blitz on feral cats in Popanyinning and captured 26 over the space of a couple of days.

## **Cuballing East Road**

I wish to acknowledge the huge effort of outside staff contributing to work on the Cuballing East Road. The team completed a 4 kilometre stretch before Christmas, and have now started work on another stretch. This work is part of the Wheatbelt Secondary Freight Network (WSFN). Over the course of the next 5 years this program will help us to upgrade the main local government freight routes to near highway standard.

WSFN will deliver over \$19M in funding to the Shire of Cuballing and significantly enhance the Shire's project management and road building capabilities.

I would also like to extend thanks to those staff who continue to maintain parks and gardens and Council buildings while the bulk of the workforce is on the road.

## **Thank You, Councillor Dowdell**

Councillor Peter Dowdell has sold his property in Cuballing and will be moving further North. Unfortunately, this means that he will be unable to continue as a Councillor for the Shire of Cuballing, so he has submitted his resignation. Even though his time on Council has been relatively short, the quality of his contribution to Council strategy and decision making has been high quality and he will be missed. We wish him well in the next chapter of his life. Council will decide at its February meeting whether to leave his position vacant until the next election in October or run an extraordinary election.

## **Farewell Fred Steer**

Fred Steer has been Deputy CEO for the last year. He has submitted his resignation to take up a new role in Workplace Health and Safety. We have enjoyed Fred's positive influence around the office and wish him well as he takes up his new challenge.

On that same afternoon I received a call from the Shire advising that a little black dog was sighted wandering along the side of the road. The person making the call said she was going to take a drive to try to locate Zac as it would take us some time to get out there from Narrogin.

Towards evening on the same afternoon, we were advised of another sighting. This one was by a resident who found Zac sitting on his front verandah. Zac quickly absconded after being detected. The Shire advised me that both her and her husband would take a spotlight and see if they could locate Zac from this new sighting. We were very surprised that would just give up their evening to assist in the search. My husband and I also went out but again were unsuccessful in finding the little fella.

The following morning my husband and I went out searching again. We had only been out a couple of hours when we received the absolute best phone call of them all. Zac had been found and secured by a resident in town. A resident who was happy to help but wanted to remain anonymous. Our sincere 'Thank You' was passed on to this person by the Shire. After meeting up with a few minutes later, we had Zac back with us.

We enquired about a Shire fee for the service and were told through a very happy and smiling face there was no charge. Also, that he was so happy for the perfect outcome and is certain that others in the community would do the same for him and his family if the need arose. We know that will happen.

The communication that took place between residents and Shire advising of sightings and the quick relaying of the messages to us, amazed us. My husband commented that this shows the residents of Cuballing are very committed to looking after each other and those that visit.

To Shire Staff, the residents of Cuballing and surrounding area that called in the sightings and the gentleman who eventually secured Zac, a very sincere 'Thank You' for returning our little treasure back to us. We will never forget the wonderful work and community spirit we experienced while we were going through this tough time.

## PROJECTS AROUND CUBALLING TOWN

2023 has started off with a bang in the Cuballing townsite with 3 major projects underway.

The demolition of the original house located next to the Independent Aged Care Living Units which will make way for future projects

Cuballing War Memorial work has started by the removal of all trees, the raised lawn section, fence and pavers that were located around the base of the war memorial. The area will see the below the list of new works take place

- New retic installation with new turf and trees to be planted along the railway side and roadside
- War Statues to be located behind the monument and were proudly supported by a DVA Grant
- New and fresh paving around the base of the existing monuments
- New installation of heritage style gazebo to be placed in the place of Mrs Campbell's seat/plaque and;
- A brand new picnic shelter which will be located behind the memorial and to the left. This shelter is proudly funded by a CBH grass roots grant.



CWA Hall works will start around the 13<sup>th</sup> February and will include the following works;

- The demolition of the back addition of the hall which consists of storage area and a toilet. Demolishing this and making way for a new extension to the back of the building consisting of two new toilets, storage room and a fresh new kitchen
- Removal of the old kitchen in the main section of the CWA which will open up and add floor space to main hall area
- Install new fence and gardens with reticulation and mulch.

## Boddington Youth get Back to Nature

Boddington Youth learnt all about local native fauna, the Hotham River and Peel-Harvey Catchment Council's (PHCC) role in protecting it when Kristy and Christine from PHCC presented as part of the Boddington Youth Centre School Holiday Program.

Christine, PHCC's Farmers for Fauna Coordinator, spoke about the amazing threatened fauna they have in their local area including woylies, red-tailed phascogales and numbats. Christine spoke about the threats to these species including predation by feral cats and foxes and how by keeping pet cats indoors or building a cat run you can help to protect our precious threatened fauna/Native animals.

Kristy, PHCC's Hotham-Williams River Restoration Coordinator used the catchment model to illustrate how land use activities can have downstream impacts, and the importance of restoring and looking after our precious waterways.

It was then time for a nature walk along to the river to look for weeds, fauna traces and to see firsthand the importance of riparian vegetation and how in its absence bank erosion can occur. Using a river water sample we looked for aqua macro invertebrates which are a biological indication of river health.

Thank you to the Shire of Boddington for inviting us to be part of the Boddington Youth Centre Holiday Program.



Addressing two constraints at once is always better than one, which makes planting saltbush on saline land a perfect solution for declining productivity due to salt as well as providing feed options for the summer feed-gap.

PHCC will run a Saltbush Field Day on Thursday 16th March to provide an opportunity for landholders to discuss the performance of past planting efforts, take a tour of previous plantings from the Greening Farms project and speak to industry representatives like Dustin McCreery from Chatfields Nursery about planting methods, variety performance and future orders.

## Greening Farms providing shelter and food for stock

PHCC's Greening Farms program has been helping farmers across the region fence their bushland and plant vegetative cover since 2018. Chad Ferguson and Lockie Coops are our most recent landowners to have completed their projects and they are looking forward to seeing their properties become greener following their efforts to revegetate their properties last year.

Lockie's project in Crossman is about increasing the habitat on his property for wildlife, which backs onto the Hotham River. He has planted 5,268 wetland/riparian species to provide more habitat for frogs and birds in along the bottom of his property.

Chad has completed a 10,000 stem native species/saltbush fodder project on his property in Hastings, which he hopes will reduce waterlogging at the site and bring some productivity back to the area, which he used to crop.

Both these projects are examples of the benefits increasing vegetation cover has for landholders in the Hotham-Williams catchment; in addition to increasing shade, lowering soil temperature and providing shelter for stock.

## COUNTRY NOTES - FEBRUARY *By Joy Meharry*

It has been awhile since writing, where oh where are other people with interesting ideas to share with us all, you are out there and we all would love to delve into your world of philosophies and thoughts on life. In the meantime, whilst you gather your thoughts for next month's edition we step back into the garden.

So far the summer has been gentler than last year's brutal onslaught, the deciduous trees have been planted, lovingly cared for and in the main survived. Only a couple were lost, that was the gardener's mistake in ordering too many trees and not enough holes prepared. It is so difficult to curb the instinct to just get a few more to place elsewhere, after all the block is larger than a quarter of an acre!

Slaters are the bane of my vegetable garden's life, where do they come from? The sneaky little critters just decimate any young seedling in a couple of hours it seems. Why do we not see the predators of these and other critters anymore? Why have they disappeared?

I have been picking tomatoes and the salads are complete with a rainbow of green, yellow, orange and shades of red tomatoes, sprinkled with fresh herbs, olive oil and seasoning. A delight to prepare, see and eat. Cucumbers, water and rock melons are developing fruit, along with eggplant and capsicums. The staples of beetroot, carrots, potatoes and herbs will take second place soon as more of the summer vegies are picked.

Oh, the pears are just dripping off the two trees, one eating and the other a later cooking one, along with the quince and two apples, one of which is still young but will not be out classed. Recipes books are being browsed to find exotic ways to preserve their sweetness and summer fragrance.

A garden shows you the ways that a community works alongside and supports each element when it is in harmony. This is also the way a community should work, no one section being ignored or only supporting those whom we see as deserving, just like us. Why are we, the people, being blamed for the decisions of governments: such as not using plastics when we do not have any say in how goods are packaged or delivered; not supporting local when we do not have shelter to park vehicles and have to struggle with prams on unfriendly pavements or through too small shop openings? Why can we not have sail cloth or trees in parking areas. Why do we have to put up with roadside verges being stripped of nature's cooling elements: trees? This creates another set of problems, weeds spring up with gay abandon along the roadsides, then they have to be sprayed out, thus three times the money spent, every couple of years – madness!

The podcast that has taken my interest is "Jam Tomorrow", a British podcast that shows how Britain's post war dreams were stolen and shattered. This could be related to most western countries the promises that are made and why we allowed them to be taken away. It is free and comes out on Mondays, two episodes have been released to date, with more to come.




