

COUNCIL SHORTS

Annual Budget Review

Even though the Budget Review was listed for consideration at the Match meeting this item was withdrawn. One of the explanatory attachments was incomplete, and the CEO was of the view that more works was required. Look out for the completed review at the April Council Meeting.

2023 Council Elections

There is presently some legislation before the parliament to change the election system for Local Government. The existing "first past the post" election system (whoever gets the most votes wins), is being replaced by a preferential voting system bringing local government elections into line with State and Federal elections. The new system will however make vote counting more difficult.

Council was asked to consider, in light of the new voting system, whether it wished to change to a postal election system run by the WA Electoral Commission or continue to hold a voting in person election run by the CEO. Council opted to remain with a voting in person election. It is notable that the new system will allow an unsuccessful candidate to be deemed elected to Council if a Council-lor resigns and that candidate had the next highest number of preferential votes.

Cuballing Golf Club Liquor License

Council supported an application by the Cuballing Golf Club to extend the hours of its liquor license to include Thursdays and Fridays from 11am to 10pm. The Golf Club has in recent times had to apply for an occasional license for individual events and the change to the license should reduce the administrative burden on the Golf Club Committee.

Independent Living Units

The Cuballing Independent Living Units are nearing completion. As a result, Council needed to make some decisions on how the units will be managed. Council agreed to some rules about how the CEO would manage the waiting list and how to set priorities. Council also set the rents to be charged at \$350 per unit, with the capacity for the rent to be reduced to \$300 per week in the case of hardship.

If you or a family member is interested in taking up one of the units please contact the CEO. Units are still available. All other things being equal, the first to apply will get the units.

Commercial Standpipe

As a result of the extensive roadworks being undertaken by the Shire on Cuballing East Road the amount of water being drawn from the Cuballing standpipe has been substantially higher than was contemplated under our agreement with Water Corporation. As a result, the Shire will be entering into a new Major Consumer Agreement which increases the ongoing capital contribution but reduces the volumetric charge. Bottom line is the new arrangements are marginally cheaper for the Shire.

CEO Performance Review

In February, the CEO celebrated his first anniversary as Cuballing's CEO. The anniversary coincides with the CEO's annual performance review. Council completed the review, commended the CEO's performance and agreed on Key Performance Indicators for the coming year.

COUNCIL SHORTS

Over the past couple of weeks contactors, Narrogin Earth Moving have been busy at work replacing and modifying crossings around the Shire of Cuballing.

First crossing on the list is located on Lol Grey Soak Road and this crossing now has a set of new box culverts to keep the river flowing and traffic crossing smoothly for years to come.

Second crossing—Continue Siding road—this crossing was a rock crossing but now boats a fresh over lay of cement and this will prevent the crossing from washing away with heavy or consistent creek flow.

Third crossing is Dent Road—In recent years Dent's road was having to be closed during winter to the river over flowing. The crew finalised this upgrade over Hotham River crossing just in time as 24hrs the opening rains arrived and the river stated to flow!!

Forth Crossing—Youngs Road Finished just this week, the road will now be open in time for easter.



NRM is the management of natural resources such as land, water, soils, plants and animals. It brings together land use planning, water management, biodiversity conservation and sustainability of industries such as agriculture, mining, tourism, fisheries and forestry.



To weed or not to weed...That is the question!

This is often a difficult question, especially when restoring a large natural area with several weed species and a limited budget.

Symphyotrichum subulatum (previously Aster subulatus), or bushy starwort, is being targeted at a number of restoration sites in the upper catchment. This species looks a bit like fleabane but prefers to grow in wet, saline soils. It is dispersed by both wind and water and has the nasty habit of producing ongoing germinations throughout summer as water along creek lines recedes and drops seed. As it grows and sets seed throughout summer, it is often left to proliferate because of the more traditional weed control seasons of autumn and spring.

Bushy starwort has been prioritised in a number of restoration areas, including Tunbridge Gully and the Williams and Quindanning River Action Plan Sites. This is the case for a number of reasons, the foremost being its growth form and density interfering with restoration efforts. The tall, spindly nature of the plant means that several thousand individuals can grow side by side within a degraded area, easily taking up residence and spreading to the detriment of native species.

Its eradication will therefore likely result in some regeneration of native species, complimented by revegetation efforts.

Dryandra Woonta project results workshop

Recently 23 local landholders and community members attended the Dryandra Woonta Project Results Workshop where we shared the results of the Dryandra Felixer™ trial and feral cat DNA analysis. Dr Karen Bettink spoke about the non-toxic Felixer™ trial which involved 6 Felixer™ units set up in photo-only mode and trialled on farms surrounding Dryandra Woodland and within the National Park itself. Once the trial has finished and the report is finalised we will share the results of the trial with the community.

Dr Heather Crawford spoke about feral cat biology and the diseases that feral cats spread. Heather also spoke about the study she completed about the gut contents of feral cats culled around Dryandra.

Dr Kim Ottewell and Robyn Shaw, who are Research scientists from DBCA, shared the results of DNA analysis of feral cats culled in and around Dryandra. The findings from this study will help to guide management actions into the future.

Tamara Wilkes-Jones discussed the numbat dig survey where she quantified numbat digs on a number of Dryandra satellite blocks. Peter Lacey from DBCA was able to provide a fauna update including graphs of the mean daily camera data showing a steady increase of numbats.

Thank you to all of the guest speakers and to the landholders who attended the event.

Hotham-Williams sub-catchment update



Saltbush fodder ready to graze

On 16th March, PHCC's Greening Farms team ran a Saltbush Field Day on two farms in the Wandering/Pumphrey's Bridge district, looking to provide local farmers with the knowledge and experience to make the most of their saltbush fodder plantings.

The event couldn't have come at a better time, as food resources in some paddocks are dwindling, the saltbush is ready and waiting to be grazed.

With between 12 -24 months of establishment behind them, new plantings of deep-rooted saltbush fodder in the Hotham-Williams catchment are ready for grazing.

Guest speaker Dustin McCreery from Chatfields Tree Nursery explained the importance of grazing saltbush once they were big enough not to pulled-out by animals feeding on the leaves, as well as the need to retain about 15-20% of the leaf-cover, so plants can recover quickly.

The Greening Farms project has been in operation since 2018, with the goal of increasing green cover on farms to provide food, fibre and shelter for livestock in the Hotham-Williams area. To date, more than 170,000 seedlings have been provided to landholders, over 120,000 of those are various forms of saltbush.

It's great to see that the species PHCC have supported to be planted in past years are now being used by farmers for grazing in the region, helping them fill the Autumn feed gap and contributing to improving their bottom line, as well as improving landscape function.

As well as providing food for stock, these plants also shade the ground, increasing soil health and provide habitat for many native species that benefit farms, like insects, fungi and birds.

Different species of saltbush can tolerate different levels of salinity, waterlogging and grazing, so it's important to understand where in the landscape each species is suited. This is where Dustin and his expert knowledge comes in. As the nation's only licensed supplier of Anameka saltbush, there were lots of questions for him in the paddock.

Country Notes for March 2023 By Joy Meharry

The rain last week was very welcomed by us, the garden and wildlife. It is amazing how quickly plants perked up and the paddocks have a slight tinge of green.

Bird life here has been subdued during the warmer months, it is only in the cool of mornings and evenings they seem to also perk up and be out and about. We have a Bittern (bird) visiting, we think it is the Australasian Bittern (Botaurus Poiciloptilus). It struts around on the paving near the back door, especially if the paving is damp early mornings then roosts in a nearby tree for the rest of the day.

The dehydrator has been put to work, eating pears, early apples, grapes and figs have been dried, packed into glass jars and stored in the pantry. Next will be cooking pears and apples, I might also try the peelings then crush them to use as a dust on top of baked goods. The pears are already been used as snacks, the flavour is intensely sweet and goes well with cheese and a glass of wine. Drying is so much less labour intensive than pickling etc and they do not get lost in the bottom of the freezer, so that is a win.

Tidying up seems to be what is getting done at the moment. Removing old tomato plants, giving lettuce that have bolted to the chickens. Then the garden beds are topped up with all the good things to make the next crop grow. Seeds are planted in punnets, cossetted, their final resting beds watered and prepared before planting out.

The tidying up is extended to the garden at large, lots of racking of leaves off the paths, clipping off overgrown bits and dead heads of the flowers. Pot plants also have not escaped attention, with some re-potted, others clipped or divided into new plants.

I have been trying to remember some books to recommend, but have not been able to feel that any read the last few weeks come up to the mark. I am looking forward to purchasing the Quarterly Essay early April though. The author is Saul Griffiths on Electrification and Community Renewal, this I believe will expand on his previous book "The Big Switch" – Australia's electric future, by giving practical ways a community can come together to build ways of producing electricity. This is done by using MP Helen Haines' researched idea of building a community battery that is owned by a community for the good of the community. Extra energy is feed back into the grid and the community benefits financially, perhaps to help those who cannot afford the upfront cost. So everyone can share in the benefits. It is something to think about, and perhaps view as part of our future.

I have not listened to any new podcast, but will recommend again "Jam Tomorrow", it seems so apt for our times and I have listened to the whole six episodes a couple of times now. So give it a go.

Oh, there is another old podcast that gives wonderful insight "Talking Politics: History of Ideas". It explores important thinkers and prominent ideas lying behind modern politics – from Hobbes to Gandhi. Again, every time you re-listen you will find more to muse over.

Perhaps you can give me some ideas on books to read or podcasts to listen to. I love sharing a good ideas also, how do you live gently, what fills you with some much happiness that you must share before you burst?


