## Background

Correspondence has been received from the Department of Parks and Wildlife, Parks and Visitor Services regarding proposed amendments to State Forests No 51,52 and 53 leading to the creation of the Dryandra Woodlands National Park and Nature Reserves.

The Woodlands are the largest and most diverse vegetation remnant in the Central Wheatbelt and in addition to the conservation and natural values that the Woodlands possess, this area is also an important recreation and tourism point.

One National Park and two Nature Reserves will be created over portions of the Dryandra Woodlands and would result in the first National Park created in the Western Australian Wheatbelt.

## It is proposed that:

- An area of approximately 16,393 hectares will be excised from State Forest No. 51 and 52 to create a Class 'A' Dryandra Woodlands National Park. The areas proposed for amendment are displayed on Map 1 (attached).
- An area of approximately 110 hectares will be excised from State Forest No 53 to create a Class 'A' Nature Reserve, with the purpose of 'Conservation of Flora and Fauna'. The areas proposed for amendment are displayed on Map 3 (attached).
- An area of approximately 2106 hectares will be excised from State Forest No 53 to create a Class 'A' Nature Reserve, with the purpose of 'Conservation of Flora and Fauna'. The areas proposed for amendment are displayed on Map 3 (attached).

As part of the process required for excisions from State forest, Council has the opportunity to object to the proposal or provide conditions to the proposal.

## Comment

As there are a number of ratepayers with rural land in areas between the proposed amendments, it may be prudent to request that a condition could be more rigorous attention to fire prevention measures be carried out in order to protect non endangered species such as sheep, cattle, pigs and cereal crops in the vicinity. More effective back burning and fire breaks should be a minimum requirement.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO STATE FOREST NO. 51, 52 AND 53 CREATION OF THE DRYANDRA WOODLANDS NATIONAL PARK AND NATURE RESERVES

The Department of Parks and Wildlife (DPaW) writes to inform the Shire of Cuballing that we are beginning implementation of the tenure proposals in the Dryandra Woodlands Management Plan 2011. In the plan areas of State Forest No. 51 and 52 are proposed to be converted to National Park and portions of State Forest No. 53 are to be converted to Nature Reserve. The map at attachment 1 indicates these areas, as outlined in the plan.

The Dryandra Woodlands are an area of significance to the Wheatbelt Region for a numerous natural, recreational and cultural reasons. The importance of this area was highlighted in the Dryandra Woodlands Management Plan 2011, which proposed the creation of the National Park and Nature Reserves you see on Attachment 1.

The Woodlands are the largest and most diverse vegetation remnant in the Central Wheatbelt. They contain 12 distinct vegetation associations, which provide an important habitat for numerous threatened and priority fauna, including the State's mammalian emblem, the Numbat. These 12 vegetation types are comprised of over 800 native plant species, including rare and priority species. The Woodlands are known to support ten threatened species of fauna and two additional species in need of further protection. These include the Carnaby's Cockatoo, Woylie, Numbat, Bilby and Chuditch.

In addition to the conservation and natural values that the Woodlands possess this area is also an important recreation and tourism point. The Woodlands currently support numerous walking trails, picnic sites, two scenic drives and low cost camping. The Irabina Study Centre and Barna Mia, an animal sanctuary, also provide recreational and educational opportunities for visitors to the region.

The Woodlands also have cultural values for the indigenous and non-indigenous peoples. These values include archaeological sites associated with scar trees, an ochre quarry and landscapes of cultural significance to the Aboriginal people. The nonindigenous cultural heritage are associated with the area's early settlement and Timber Industry, the cottages from the original forestry settlement has been maintained and are now part of accommodation within the woodlands.

DPaW is proposing the creation of one National Park and two Nature Reserves over portions of the Dryandra Woodlands to ensure that these values are protected for further generations. The creation of the Dryandra Woodlands National Park would also be the first National Park created in the Western Australian Wheatbelt.

It is proposed that:

- An area of approximately 16393 hectares to be excised from State Forest No. 51 and 52 to create a Class 'A' Dryandra Woodlands National Park. The areas proposed for amendment are displayed on Map 1 at Attachment 2.
- An area of approximately 110 hectares to be excised from State Forest No. 53 to create a Class 'A' Nature Reserve, with the purpose of 'Conservation of Flora and Fauna'. The areas proposed for amendment are displayed on Map 2 at Attachment 2.
- An area of approximately 2106 hectares to be excised from State Forest No. 53 to create a Class 'A' Nature Reserve, with the purpose of 'Conservation of Flora and Fauna'. The areas proposed for amendment are displayed on Map 3 at Attachment 2.

As part of the process required for excisions from State forest DPaW is seeking the necessary approvals.







## Background

Correspondence has been received from the Department of Environment Regulation (DER) regarding amendments to the Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997 which have revised existing delegations of the powers of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to local government officers.

The new delegations were gazetted on 20 December 2013. Central to the amendments are four new regulations providing for better management of noise from motor sport venues, shooting venues, sporting, cultural and entertainment venues and from certain essential works such as garbage collection. The powers of the CEO have been delegated to the CEO of the local government in each of these cases, to enable these important decisions to be made at the local level. In addition, the powers of the CEO that had already been delegated to local government CEOs (and to Environmental Health Officers in some cases) have been revised to fit in with the amended regulations.

DER states that local government has exercised an invaluable role in managing environmental noise issues under the noise regulations since 1997, and it is anticipated that this will continue under the amended regulations. In order to assist local governments in this role, DER is preparing a series of guidelines and DER Noise Regulation Branch is available to provide technical and strategic advice. The amended regulations allow the local government CEO to charge fees to enable recovery of some of the costs of assessing applications and processing the special approvals.

## Comment

This delegated authority is another example of cost shifting from a State Government Department. The Shire of Cuballing employs an Environmental Health Officer/Building Surveyor for one day per week. This time is insufficient to deal with the current workload and a further one day per week is required to keep up to date with building and health issues.

The author has discussed the possibility of attending for an additional day with the Environmental Health Officer/Building Surveyor, however he is unable to do so due to other commitments.

Informal discussions have taken place regarding the risk of legal action in the future and the requirement for public liability cover in that event.

Council has public liability cover, however in order for a claim to be accepted, responsibility for content would have to be accepted by Council. Given that a very small portion of the newsletter is provided by Council Staff, there is a risk that in the future there is a possibility that a member of the community could be aggrieved by an error, omission or article within the newsletter.

The possibility of Popanyinning Progress Association taking on the responsibility for the newsletter was also discussed, although no correspondence has been received from the Association regarding acceptance or otherwise.

#### Comment

The liability issue is one which needs resolution as soon as possible.

#### COMMENT

As some of you would know, WALGA, as the representative body for Local Government in Western Australia, has held the position for some time that some structural reform is needed.

Several years ago it commissioned a report titled "The Journey" now commonly referred to as the SSS Report.

Clause 3.3 of The Scope for Change in the SSS Report introduction says:

"The SSS Panel Report was careful to emphasise that there was no demonstrated case that amalgamations of Local Governments will deliver improved outcomes. The forced amalgamation of Local Governments without existing capability and without specific regard to the ability to deliver more sustainable arrangements offers slim prospects of improvement. The extensive work of the five working parties which have generated the Plan has confirmed this conclusion."

In 2009 the then Minister for Local Government John Castrilli MLA announced a policy to reform local government in W.A. There were few guidelines and largely a lack of direction other than to say that there are too many local governments and this should be changed.

Sustainability was used as the focus and little or no regard was given for the valuable contribution that Local Government provides for a community and the social dividend of that.

Councils and staff have invested thousands of hours and millions of dollars to comply with the Minister's regulatory requests to submit business case plans and develop strategies within those plans.

Most, if not all Local Governments fulfilled these obligations in writing direct to the Minister through the Department of Local Government.

Since then the State Government has shifted its reform focus away from the country areas towards the metropolitan area. There are concerns however, that whatever happens in the metropolitan area will be repeated in the country.

The State Government has no mandate or ethical position to accuse Local Government of being poor managers of assets and finances.



Successive State Government's, have neglected to maintain essential infrastructure such as Tier 3 railways, roads, hospitals, electricity supply grids, water supplies throughout WA. Local Governments and their communities are adversely impacted by that.

In fact there is considerable pressure on Local Governments to increase the range of services that they deliver and also to manage this within already tight budgets. Cost shifting by both State and Federal Governments has been a large part of that. Rural local governments are increasingly having to fund medical services as well as provide housing for police, teachers and doctors. There has been a steady withdrawal of state services and decline in the standards of infrastructure.

If the State and Federal governments were to resume funding tasks that are not the core function of Local Government, then the relief to the Local Government budgets would, in most cases rejuvenate their sustainability.

The following motion is submitted by the Shire of Wagin for consideration and support

- 1. That WALGA reject any moves by the State Government to force the amalgamation of local governments.
- 2. That amalgamations, mergers and boundary changes be supported by WALGA only if introduced and supported by the affected Local Governments.
- 3. That each Local Government community be entitled to hold a poll if structural change is proposed.
- 4. That this resolution be submitted to the Central Country Zone of WALGA for consideration by the zone.
- 5. That the Shire President circulates this resolution to <u>ALL</u> WA Local Governments via email and letter seeking their support and requesting that they submit this motion to their next Zone meeting for consideration.

#### Background

In the past there has been an adhoc approach taken to wage increases with an estimated CPI figure being provided in the adopted budget and applied at various times. Furthermore, due to past difficulty in obtaining experienced applicants, all staff have been paid in excess of 20% over their relevant award level. This is a common practice throughout the Wheatbelt in order to attract staff to the region.

The CPI increase from June 2012 to July 2013 was 2.6%, however it is believed that the Local Government CPI has increased by up to double that amount.

Works staff received a 4.2% increase in early 2013. The increase was higher than CPI in exchange for productivity improvements and less damage to plant. This increase was for a six month period with two separate reviews to be undertaken after five months. The previous increase had been 2011.

The works staff are all employed as Plant Operator/General Hand and are paid the same hourly rate whether they are operating plant or not.

#### Comment

Reviews have shown improved work practices and less damage to plant/personnel. The outside crew have worked in some extreme weather conditions over the past few months and productivity has not decreased. Council is fortunate that there is a diverse range of skills amongst the crew.

An estimate of the previous year's CPI increase (2.6%) is provided within the annual wages budget to enable a wage increase during the following year.

#### OFFICER COMMENT

In response the Council's resolution August 2013 the following is noted:

- 2 (a) the easement to the property has not been graded however is able to be travelled upon by a 2wd vehicle.
  - In relation to the SAT mediation meeting Mr. Street decided not to pursue a hearing through SAT following a meeting he had with the CEO and the ex Shire President. This means that the initial resolution by Council at its April 2013 meeting which relates to Mr. Street providing a report by a Town Planning Consultant did not eventuate:
  - (b) The requirement for toilet facilities has been reduced as it has been verbally indicated that only up 10 patrons will be using the park at anyone time. Therefore, approval has been issued for the toilet facilities on the condition that the numbers using the park at anyone time do not exceed 10 persons. Should the park have any more than this number then the toilet facilities will need to be re-assessed.
  - (c) The fire Management Plan has not been received from the Popanyinning Bush Control Officer. An inspection of the proposed Motorcycle Park by the author of this report on the 30 January 2014 in company with Chief Bushfire Control Officer Mr. Anthony Mort revealed deficiencies in egress from the park in case of an emergency such as a bush fire. The property is completely landlocked apart from the way in via an easement. Calcoran Road will be made accessible for two wheeled vehicles to the east of the property when Council has completed the Reeds Road construction project. The Chief Bushfire Control Officer (CBFCO) is satisfied that a two wheel drive vehicle is able to traverse the terrain to the South. Calcoran Road is an unmade road owned by the Shire of Cuballing and in the opinion of the CBFCO will be suitable for exit purposes once graded.
    - All patrons to be briefed on the location of fire extinguishers muster point and exits prior to using the facility. All emergency exits should be signed posted.
    - Mr. Street has done a very good job of maintaining his property as well as plenty of firebreaks. The CBFCO and CEO have advised Mr Street to hand out emergency management information to all patrons entering the facility and to have a strong set of wire cutters at the siren location should fences need to be cut in the event of an approaching fire.
- (h) In relation to compliance with the Health Act the Motorcycle Park falls within the definition of a Public Building irrespective of whether there is a building or not. Consequently prior to it operating, it will need to be approved as such. The main concern as a public building is egress and until such time as this is resolved as well as all the other outstanding item from Council Resolution its meeting in August 2013 it should not be used.

The Motorcycle tracks have been built in a professional manner which may indicate that if the Motorcycle Park becomes popular the number of 10 people currently



indicated may increase. Mr. Street will invite participant through bookings only so the numbers can be controlled in this manner.

The use of the Motorcycle Park was advertised in the 'Cuby News' and no conclusive objections were received. However, there were two items of correspondence received citing noise and increase traffic as a possible issue. All adjoining landowners using the easement have been notified in writing and have given their permission to use the easement in writing. Furthermore, the owner of the land to the south of the facility has given his permission to use his property in the event of an emergency.

As there has been so much discussion on this matter it may be prudent to revoke previous decisions and list requirements for approval of the motorcycle park in a single decision.

# Background

The Cuballing Mens' Shed has been established since 2010 and follows the principles of the Australian Mens' Shed Association, which are as follows:

The Australian Men's Sheds Association recognizes a Men's Shed as any community-based, non-profit, non-commercial organization that is accessible to all men and whose primary activity is the provision of a safe, friendly and healing environment where men are able to work on meaningful projects at their own pace in their own time in the company of other men. A major objective is to advance the well-being and health of their male members and to encourage social inclusion.

In order to access grant funding, they are required to have some security of tenure such as a lease for their premises.

The Cuballing Mens' Shed endeavours to be as self supporting as possible and fundraises by collecting scrap metal and aluminium cans. It contributes to the wellbeing of menfolk in the community by providing a means of social inclusion and activity.

#### Comment

The land upon which the premises are located is at the depot and is held by the Shire of Cuballing as freehold land. As such, there are no requirements for permission to lease and limitations of tenure.

Council provides Oxygen, Acetylene and Argon gases and the cylinder rental for those gases, together with a petty cash float of \$500 which has been in existence since the establishment of the Mens' Shed. Electricity and water are provided from the Shire Depot supply.

A draft lease has been prepared and is attached.

The Local Government Act requires the following prior to disposing of property by private treaty:

- 3.58 (3) A local government can dispose of property other than under subsection (2) if, before agreeing to dispose of the property
  - a) it gives local public notice of the proposed disposition -
  - (i) describing the property concerned; and
  - (ii) giving details of the proposed disposition; and

(iii) inviting submissions to be made to the local government before a date to be specified in the notice, being a date not less than 2 weeks after the notice is first given;

#### And

- (b) it considers any submission made to it before the date specified in the notice and, if its decision is made by the council or a committee, the decision and the reasons for it are recorded in the minutes of the meeting at which the decision was made.
- 3.58 (4) The details of a proposed disposition that are required by subsection (3) (a) (ii) include
  - (a) The names of all other parties concerned
  - (b) The consideration to be received by the local government for the disposition; and
  - (c) The market value of the disposition -
    - (i) As ascertained by a valuation carried out not more than 6 months before the proposed disposition; or
    - (ii) As declared by a resolution of the local government on the basis of a valuation carried out more than 6 months before the proposed disposition that the local government believes to be a true indication of the value at the time of the proposed disposition

The valuation of the property was carried out by AVP Valuers with a reinstatement value of \$140,000. Although this valuation is more than 6 months old, it is unlikely that there would be much price movement in this type of building, furthermore, as there is only a 5.5 metre wide strip of land (to the south side of the building) included with the building and the site is zoned Rural Townsite, it is unlikely there would be a commercial or industrial demand for the property.

# AGREEMENT TO LEASE



THIS AGREEMENT FOR LEASE is made on the $\underline{\ }$	day of	201	3

#### **BETWEEN:-**

- 1. SHIRE OF CUBALLING of PO Box 13, Cuballing, Western Australia ("Lessor") of the first part, and
- 2. CUBALLING MENS' SHED of c/- Post office, Cuballing Western Australia ("the Lessee") of the second part.

#### NOW THIS AGREEMENT FOR LEASE WITNESSES:

- 1. Part of those premises situated in Cuballing on Lot B9 being Freehold Land Vol 325 Folio 42; owned by the Lessor
- 2. The Lessor hereby agrees to lease to the Lessee all those premises which are for the purpose of identification only shown edged red on the plan attached to this Agreement ("the Demised Premises") to be held by the Lessee for a term ("the Term") of Twenty (20) years commencing on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_at a total rental of 1 peppercorn subject to the covenants and conditions hereafter contained and subject to the covenants and powers implied under the Transfer of Lands Act 1983 as amended unless negatived or modified by this agreement.
- 3. The lessee hereby covenants with the Lessor as follows:
  - a) To pay to the Lessor the rent reserved in the manner appointed for payment of same without any deduction without any deduction or abatement whatsoever.
  - b) To keep the buildings and other improvements (if any) upon the Demised Premises in the same condition as they now are fair wear and tear excepted.
  - c) To observe all statues and regulations made by any duly constituted authority affect in the Demises Premises or the occupation thereof.
  - d) Not to part with possession of the Demised Premises without obtaining the prior written consent of the Lessor such consent not to be unreasonably withheld.
  - e) To keep the Demised Premises and all fixtures and chattels (if any) in good condition, fair wear and tear excepted.
  - f) To permit the Lessor of his agent to inspect the Demised Premises at all reasonable times and reasonable intervals.
  - g) Upon the determination of the lease to yield up to the Lessor the Demised Premises in such good repair and condition as is consistent with this agreement in that behalf.
  - h) The Demised premises be used for the purpose of a "Mens' Shed"
  - i) To indemnify and keep indemnified the Lessor from and against all claims, demands, writs, summonses, actions, suits, proceedings, judgements, orders, decrees, damages, costs, losses and expenses of any nature whatsoever which the Lessor may suffer or incur in connection with loss of life, personal injury and or damage to property arising from or out of any occurrence in, upon or at the Demised Premises or any part thereof or to any person or the property of any person using or entering on or near the Demised Premises or occasioned (wheresoever it may occur wholly or in part by any act, neglect, default or omission by the Lessee, his agents, contractors, servants, workmen, customers or any other person or persons using or upon the Demised Premises with his consent or approval express or implied.
  - j) To use and occupy the Demised Premises at the Lessee's own risk and the Lessee hereby releases to the full extent permitted by law the Lessor and its

- agents, servants, contractors and employees from all claims and demands of every kind resulting from any accident, damage or injury occurring therein.
- k) Not to mortgage lien or in any way charge or encumber the Lessee's interest in this Agreement for Lease.
- To keep in force all licences and permits required for the carrying on of any business conducted by the lessee in or upon the Demised Premises.
- m) To pay the lessor's legal cost and disbursements in connection with the preparation, execution, completion and stamping of this Lease.
- 4.
- A) In default of any of the covenants contained in this Agreement for Lease and provided that such default shall continue for not less than fourteen (14) days after the day on which the notice of that default is given to the Lessee by the Lessor then the Lessor may at any time thereafter enter upon the Demised Premises and retake possession of them without prejudice to any other remedy that the Lessor may have
- B) Notice in terms of clause 3 (a) of this Agreement for Lease shall be deemed to have been property given if left at the address of the Lessee specified in this Agreement or at such other address of the Lessee specified in this agreement or at such other address within Western Australia as the lessee shall have notified the Lessor in writing.
- 5. The lessor to the intent of binding the Demised Premises and the proprietor thereof for the time being but not so as to render the Lessor personally liable in damages except for the Lessor's own acts and defaults while the Lessor remains such proprietor hereby covenants and agrees with the Lessee:-
  - (a) that the Lessee duly paying the rent hereby reserved and performing and observing the terms, covenants and conditions herein expressed or implied and on the part of the Lessee to be performed and observed shall peaceably and quietly hold and enjoy the Demised Premises during said term or any extension thereof without any interruption by the Lessor or by any person or persons rightfully claiming under or in trust for the Lessor:
  - (b) to pay all outgoings not otherwise payable by the Lessor.
- 6. The Lessor and the Lessee hereby expressly agree and declare as follows:
  - (a) The Lessor does not expressly agree or impliedly warrant that the Demised Premises are now or will remain suitable or adequate for all or any of the purposes of the Lessee and all warranties (if any) as to suitability and adequateness of the Demised Premises implied by law are to the extent permitted by law hereby expressly negatived.
  - (b) That if the Lessee shall remain in occupation of the Demised Premises after the expiration of the Lease the Lessee shall so remain as a tenant from week to week but subject nevertheless to the terms, covenants and conditions hereof so far as the same are applicable to a weekly tenancy and such tenancy shall be terminable at the expiration of one week's notice by either party to the other at any time.
  - (c) (i)The Lessor shall not less the five months before the expiration of the term notify the Lessee in writing whether or not he intends to re-lease the Demised Premises .

(ii)In the event of the Lessor notifying the Lessee that he intends to re-lease the Demised Premises the Lessee shall within fourteen days after receiving the Lessor's notice advise the Lessor in writing whether or not he wishes to renew his lease of the Demised Premises subject to agreeing a new rent.

(iii)If the Lessee gives notice advising the Lessor that he does not wish to re-lease the Demised Premises the Lessor and the Lessee shall immediately commence negotiating the new rent for the new term. The New Rent for the new term shall be the then Market Rent to be agreed by the parties. PROVIDED ALWAYS that in no event shall the rent as so assessed be less than the rent payable during the last year of the Term.

(iv)If for any reason whatsoever the lessor and the Lessee are unable to agree what the new rent shall be on or before a date three months before the expiration of the Term the Lessee shall be deemed to have advised the Lessor that the Lessee does not wish to renew his lease of the Demised Premises and the Lessor shall thereupon be entitled to enter into a lease of the Demised Premises with any third party such lease to commence on a date after the expiration of the Term

If for any reason whatsoever the Cuballing Mens' Shed ceases to carry on Mens' Shed activities in the demised premises for a period of six months or more, the Lessor reserves the right to terminate the lease.
