

Popanyinning Transfer Station Open

The new Popanyinning Transfer Station opened on Saturday 7 July 2017.

Using the Transfer Station will require residents to place their waste into large skip bins rather than on the ground at the landfill site. The waste in the skip bins will be transferred to the Narrogin landfill site fortnightly or more often if required.

The only change for local residents disposing of waste at the Transfer Station will be the need to manually dispose of larger amounts of waste from their vehicle. Waste will not be able to be mechanically tipped into the skip bins from a vehicle.

The Shire has been operating a similar Transfer Cuballing for 12 months and this has improved the waste management practices. Transfer Stations particularly reduce wind blown waste on the site and make it more difficult for feral animals.

Charging for disposing of Tyres

From 1st July 2017 Council will charge for the disposal of tyres at the Cuballing and Popanyinning Transfer Stations.


Shire of Cuballing waste is now transferred to Narrogin and the Narrogin Waste Disposal Site charges for disposing of tyres.

To dispose of tyres, residents will visit the Shire Office, pay for the disposal of their tyres and then take the receipt to the Transfer Station.

The charges for disposing of tyres are:

Per Tyre - Tractor (up to 1metre)	\$44.00

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Bridal Creeper Project

The Popanyinning Progress Association (PPA) has been awarded a grant to start the Bridal Creeper Eradication Project on the Hotham River banks, in the township of Popanyinning.

The broadcast spraying of the infested areas will start on Thursday (the 13th July), weather permitting, by contractor Dean Morgan from Wagin.

A vegetation survey has already been completed by Peter Denton, of Cuballing, in which he has identified the native species, as well as the invasive weeds.

Following this spray event, a series of spot sprays will be undertaken by members of the PPA.

There will also be a Chemical Handling course being undertaken by 6 members of the PPA, at the POPO Hall on the 24th and 25th of July, to ensure safe handling of the chemicals involved in the spot spraying of the bridal creeper further back from the river banks.

The final step in this process for 2017 will be the planting of 400 seedlings in the area currently occupied by the bridal creeper. Theses seedlings have been sourced, and currently cared for, by Peter Denton.

The PPA haver also submitted a second application for further funding to continue the process next year. It is envisaged, that should the funding be forthcoming, the

area to the south of the heavy vehicle crossing over the Hotham River in Popanyinning will be targetted, including the verges of Lord Street and York Road.

A re-spray of the original area will also be done, if required.

This project is the beginning of the eradication process. Bridal Creeper corms have been known to sprout up to 5-20 years after being treated, if the weather is favourable. Spot spraying will be very important to keep that process at a minimum, and members of the PPA have the responsibility for that over the next few years. The PPA have had this project on their "to do list" for years, and it is with great excitement that we are finally able to proceed, with the support of the Federal Government funding program, Smarty Grants. If you would like to become involved with this project, or others as time goes on, you are very welcome to come along to one of our vibrant, lively meetings, held on the last Wednesday evening of the month, at the POpo Hall, starting at 6.30pm. 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A Short Tale of Feral Cats Part 2

What impact do cats have on Australian Fauna?

Reported impacts of cats on native fauna in Australia include, most frequently, direct predation on mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and some invertebrates.

Dickman (1996) proposed a ranking system to evaluate the susceptibility of native species to predation by feral cats, suggesting that species up to 3 kg, but most frequently those below 220 g (mammals) and 200 g (birds), are most susceptible to predation by feral cats. The Threat Abatement Plan for Predation by Feral Cats (2008) lists 35 threatened and three unlisted bird species, 36 mammals, seven threatened and two unlisted reptiles, and three amphibian species likely to be impacted adversely by feral cats. The specific species are listed in DEWHA 2008.

There is also evidence of potential threats from cats to native species through the diseases and parasites. The cat is the only definitive host for the protozoan parasite Toxoplasma gondii that causes toxoplasmosis, a condition recorded in several species of birds and mammals (Moodie 1995).

Although there is a lack of data on competition between cats and native species, larger dasyurids, varanids and large raptors are the most likely to suffer a reduction in available resources through competition with cats (Glen and Dickman 2005, 2008). The impacts of cats on native fauna may be exacerbated when the prey species are also

negatively impacted by habitat modification, by climatic events such as droughts, fires and floods, and by disease and changes in food distribution and abundance. (some estimations are between 17.5 and 180 million a night)

Humans provide food and resources for feral and stray cats

Throughout the Australian mainland highly modified habitats provide opportunity for feral or stray cats.

Such sites include rubbish tips, large and small townships, homesteads, mining sites and tourist resorts, which provide food, resting and nesting sites and breeding opportunities for cats. In such habitats, cats have been recorded forming localised but dense colonies, based on matrilines, where females defend the resources and recruit their own kittens to the colony (Denny et al 2002).

Dietary studies have shown that cats also scavenge. Scavenged items, including human food scraps, have been identified in the scats of cats considered to be mainly dependent upon live prey. Jones and Coman (1981) found both human food scraps and carrion in the diet of cats from three areas in New South Wales and Victoria.

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

Using Dogs to Reign in Cats!

PHCC congratulates the Numbat Taskforce on securing funds through the Threatened Species Commissioner and the Foundation for Australia's Most Endangered Species (FAME), enabling the purchase of two feral cat detection dogs for two years.

PHCC, the Department of Parks and Wildlife (DPaW) and landholders neighbouring Dryandra are also working hard to restore and maintain healthy populations of threatened fauna species. In partnership with PHCC, adjacent landholders undertake feral animal control on their properties while DPaW continues to monitor and protect threatened species within Dryandra.

PHCC Visits Local Shires

Jane O'Malley, CEO of PHCC and Mel Durack, the Hotham-Williams NRM Officer presented to Local Governments acknowledging the great work in the upper catchment and the success of collaborative projects between PHCC, local shires and community members in meeting NRM goals.

Jane and Mel gave special mention to the Hotham-Williams Rivers 2 Ramsar project, where 28 private land owners have taken up grants to implement weed control, fencing and revegetation projects.

Community Scores High in the Fight **Against Ferals**

The Wandering Hotham Declared Species Group recently completed a successful feral pig trapping program with significant numbers removed from the catchment in both the Wandering and Boddington Shires. The program has been successful in reducing feral pig numbers due to the joint effort and ongoing commitment by the local landholders.

The timely removal of feral pigs from the area prevents the establishment of permanent populations of pigs before they threaten flora, displace fauna and degrade water quality.

Feral Cats

Catling (1988) similarly found carrion in the diet of cats from semi-arid New South Wales. Paltridge et al (1997) reported carrion in the stomachs of cats from central Australia during dry winters when live prey was scarce, while in a study in central New South Wales, Molsher et al (1999) found that cattle and pig carcasses were scavenged by cats, albeit infrequently. Dickman (2009) described the diet of cats exploiting suburban and temperate habitats in the Sydney basin in New South Wales, and reported that the volumetric occurrence of scavenged items in scats (both organic and inorganic) ranged from zero to 57 per cent.

Cat Management Strategies

Successful cat control programs in Australia are comprised of the eradication of cats on several islands and within fenced reserves and sanctuaries on the mainland, with few control programs having yet been implemented throughout the broader landscape.

Newsome (1991) outlined several possible control methods for stray and feral (free-living) cats in Australia, including shooting, trapping, poisoning or biological control (disease). Olsen (1998) added habitat manipulation and physical exclusion (by fences and other barriers) to the list of vertebrate pest management strategies. Legislative strategies, community and incentive schemes such as bounties may be included as part of the overall management structure that is needed, although successful reduction of cat numbers or impact will clearly still depend on methods of control in the field.


Control strategies that have been adopted on mainland Australia and offshore islands are shooting, trapping, poisoning and the introduction of feline panleucopaenia (Brothers 1982; Muir 1982; Brothers et al 1985; Domm and Messersmith 1990; Short et al 1997; Algar and Burrows 2004). Successful cat eradication measures have all involved the use of more than one approach.

Poisons


Alternative delivery routes for some toxins are through broken skin or by placement on fur, to be licked off during subsequent grooming.

Ongoing studies in New Zealand are investigating the utility of bait delivery devices that include sensors that discriminate between species based on morphometrics, such as weight, head/body length, height and leg length. The enclosed devices can contain traps, baits or include a system for squirting toxin onto the targeted animal.

The research is continuing at present (Paul Jansen, pers comm). As no currently available toxins are cat specific, and the likelihood of baiting programs impacting on *Cont on page 15*









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Cuballing War Memorial Stephen Bowes Private Archibald Campbell

In the peaceful surrounds of the Cuballing Cemetery, the Campbells rest.

Duncan (died 12/10/42) lies alongside his wife, Margaret (4/3/44). Also interred here are son Duncan (1979), and daughters Mary (1961) and Margaret (1990). The latter Margaret was, for many years (1946 to 1974), the Cuballing post mistress, assisted by her sister Mary.

The Campbell sisters occupied the post office building at Lot 20, which was completed in August 1913. 'Numbat Country' (E. Roots) further records: "Maggie Campbell came from a family who had migrated from Scotland and settled east of Yornaning in 1913, when she was ten years". "Mr Campbell was a dour Scottish man who worked hard establishing the property" (Location 6692). "They were a family who kept very much to themselves".

There were three other children, Christina, Catherine and Archibald. Christina moved to New Zealand, and we know little of Catherine's life. Archibald, however, is recorded on the Great War Roll of Honour for Cuballing.

Archie Campbell applied to enlist at Perth on February 9, 1916. He declared that he was single, a driver by trade, 21 years of age, and staying at the Duke of York Hostel, Perth.

His medical recorded a young man of Presbyterian faith, five feet 5.5 inches tall, 118 pounds, of fresh complexion, with blue eyes and brown hair.

The 44th Infantry Battalion being raised at Claremont became known as "Old Bill's Thousand", after its commanding officer, Lt Col William Mansbridge. Archibald Campbell was allocated as Private 356, in B Company, to the 44th Battalion, in the 11th Brigade, 3rd Australian Division. The battalion left Fremantle on 6/6/1916 aboard HMAT Suevic A29. On board. he was treated for measles and he disembarked at Plymouth in good health. On 25/11/1916, Archie crossed the Channel via Southampton, with his battalion as the newly raised 3rd Australian Division under Monash headed for France. He was transferred on detachment in December to Number 4 Company, 3rd Divisional Train, and promoted to Driver, but re-joined the 44th Battalion shortly afterwards in January, 1917.

The Third Division's first major engagement was the Battle of Messines, an offensive in Belgian Flanders to capture the ridge which ran through Ploegsteert Wood in the south, Messines, Wytschaete and Mount Sorrel, to deny the Germans the high ground south of Ypres.

The battle was preceded by the explosion of large mines under the German lines, on June 7, 1917 followed by the infantry attack. A plan by General Sir Herbert Plumer, of the British Second Army, Messines was a success.

In the aftermath of the glowing victory at Messines, as the 44th Battalion were engaged in defending gains made in the Ypres Sector, 356 Private Archibald Campbell was killed in action one hundred years ago, on July 10, 1917, aged 22 years

He has no known grave, and is commemorated on the Menin Gate memorial to Commonwealth soldiers missing in Belgium.

Archie's personal effects were returned to his father, Duncan, having been conveyed aboard the SS Barambah: New Testament, Book (1st Aid), Brush, Military Book, Match box with chain attached, Watch (damaged), Belt (linen).

In completing the Roll of Honour Circular for the War Memorial's historian, the bereaved father revealed that his son had raised his age to enlist, that he had been born near Oban, Argyllshire, and had come to Australia with the family as a fourteen year old.

non target species is relatively high, the development of methods of delivery that are cat specific may prove to be the most feasible way of conducting broad scale cat control programs using toxins.



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Vale Maurice White

The Narrogin Arts Group recently launched their 50th Anniversary Memories book. The book was written, after many hours of research, by Maurice White, a former teacher at the Narrogin Senior High School.

He was too ill to attend the launch in May, and after just 10 days in palliative care, Maurice White passed away on the 23rd of June, aged 81 years.

An active member of the Narrogin Old Courthouse Museum, Maurice will be sadly missed.

He was not only a wonderful English teacher who inspired others to teach and write., he made language live. He was dedicated to local repertory, was a man of ethics and was the font of all things historical. He was the go-to-man at the high school - the "google" of his time - who willingly shared his knowledge with anyone who asked. He inspired others to learn and his memory will live on in the great work he did collecting the history of Narrogin. He was the author of the Narrogin School of Agriculture: Nearly 100 Years.

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

Let's talk about Aged Care

If you are looking at Residential Care options and they start talking about bonds, the first thing that comes to mind is probably what for and will I get it back?

Residential Aged Care bonds are paid to the facility and are based on a number of financial factors such as value of the family home, cash in the bank, shares and term deposits and income. If you are considering residential care then it can be very daunting to be confronted with that fact that may have to pay of bond of between \$300,000 and 1.1 million depending on the location and if you are looking at a shared on single room. The bond is different at each aged care home based on the location and other factors and is set by the aged care provider, some facilities also charge an extra services fee which can be as much as \$30 or more dollars a day on top of the other fees.

There are benefits to using a Consultant to assist you negotiate the payment of fees and bonds, make applications and arrange tours of places that fit your budget and needs, they can negotiate with the facility how the bond is paid and what the process is and take away some of the stress and pressure, all for a reasonable fee.
