

Alien Invasion of Popanyinning??



No, It is the local participants in the Popanyinning Progress Association's (PPA) Bridal Creeper Eradication Project, undertaking the course on chemical handling and management in Popanyinning Hall last week. The course instructor, Craig Watt from Mandurah, led the group through two days of theory and prac in the elements of managing,. storing and using various chemicals. Each of the participants was issued with a PPE (Personal Protection Equipment) pack - most of which you can see in the photo above.

The course is part of the

commitments made by the PPA, in being awarded a substantial grant for the ongoing fight against the invasive Bridal Creeper along the Hotham River in Popanyinning.

PPA president, Deb Hopper, is hoping that this will be stage 1 of further grants to enable the group to continue the eradication program both up and down stream, from the central area being targetted this year. The proposed plan includes a respray of this area next year.

The enthusiasm shown by the group of six (above) should be a good indicator of the success of the eradication project.

The second phase of the project, stage 1, is tree planting - if you love digging in dirt, we'd love to hear from you... and we'll keep you up to date as project milestones are met.

How many native insects live in your garden?

We tend to place a strong emphasis on the importance of exotic bees in our garden, to pollinate our fruit, vegetables and other native and exotic plants. Bees do play an important role in the process, but have you ever considered the importance of our own native insects?

Native ants, bees, hover flies, the plain old "Aussie fly" moths, butterflies, beetles plus countless more native insects do carry out the bulk of the cross pollination process in the bushlands and our own gardens. In our monoculture fields of wheat, canola insects do play a role but in these environments the majority of the pollination is carried out by the wind.

Ants visit flowering plants regularly to enjoy the sweet nectars, pollen and sap extruding from branches, plus taking any other unsuspecting insects in the process. During their busy excursions from plant to plant the cross pollination process is invariably performed.

Native hover flies and native bees (of which there are many species) are important links in the pollinating process.

What do we plant? Well the obvious choice is to plant native (local endemic where possible]) species in our gardens, planting wholesale or amongst existing exotic species. Grevilleas, thriptomene, pimeleas (for the hoverflies and butterflies) correas, dryandra and banksia species, hakeas, eremophilas are some of many species to suggest.

Planting bird attracting species such as grevilleas attracts honeyeaters, who not only love pollen but they do also eat many harmful insects such as aphids particularly during the breeding season. Honey possums, (which I have in my garden) and yes the common possum too are attracted by the nectar feast. By attracting the native insects, birds and animals to our gardens completes the cross pollinating circuit. *Peter Denton, Cuballing*

Shire of Cuballing 2017/18 Budget

The Council adopted the Shire of Cuballing 2017/18 Budget at the July Ordinary Council Meeting.

The significant sources of income in the 2017/18 Shire Budget included:


- a 4% increase in Rates to a total amount of \$1,070,994;
- federal government Financial Assistance Grants of \$466,848;
- Roads to Recovery grant funding of \$243,253;
- state government State Road Funding of \$381,926;
- state government Direct Road Grant of \$99,902; and
- Emergency Services Levy operational funding of \$20,625.

The significant expenditure planned for 2017/18 includes:

- a Road Construction Program of \$857,618 including:
 - \Rightarrow continued widening of Wandering Narrogin Road
 - \Rightarrow widening of sections of Stratherne Road;
 - \Rightarrow widening of a section of Popanyinning West Road
 - ⇒ final seals on previous works on Popanyinning West Road, Yornaning West Road, Victoria Road and Cuballing East Road.
- road Maintenance works of \$989,877 including gravel road grading works, gravel sheeting, tree pruning, minor drainage works on various roads;
- replacement of a rubber tyred road roller for \$170,000 changeover;
- upgrades to water standpipes at Cuballing and Popanyinning to improve reliability and service;
- upgrades at the Cuballing Transfer Station to improve fencing and provide oil recycling services;
- provide DrumMuster collection points at Cuballing and Popanyinning Transfer Stations;
- building renewal works to the Cuballing CWA building, Cuballing Town Hall and Cuballing Recreation Centre;
- grant funding of conservation fencing works at Yornaning Dam;
- improvements to the Cuballing War Memorial Park.

Council Meeting—July 2017

At their June Ordinary Meeting, the Council:

- adopted an updated Freedom of Information Statement. This statement is available on the Shire website;
- decided to have a Voting-in-Person election and not a Postal Voting election run by the WAEC. The cost of the Postal Voting election was over \$8,000 more expensive that a Votingin-Person election;
- Indicated conditional support for a subdivision to create a new title for a gravel pit on Shaddicks Road, East Popanyinning;
- decided to commence the process for a general amendment to Council's Town Planning Scheme to bring the Scheme up to date;
- supported legal action to recover unpaid rates on two properties that could result in the sale of the properties;
- wrote off one sundry debt for \$330 that was uneconomic to recover but chose to continue to seek to recover another two sundry debts for \$330 where the debtor remains a resident of the Shire;

WA Seniors Card Discount Change

On 22 June 2017, the States Government announced changes to the cap amounts for local government rates for WA Seniors Card holder households. The cap for has been set at \$100.

The changes will operate from 1 July 2017.

The WA Seniors Card holders' concessions remain at 25 per cent of Council Rates up to the capped amount.

For households with Commonwealth concessions cards, the State Government will

continue to provide the 50 per cent rebate for local government rates capped at \$750. These capped amounts remain unchanged from those that applied in 2016-17.

All Pensioners and Seniors cardholders are required to provide the Shire with an up-todate copy of their card to be eligible for their discount.


Cuballing Skate Park Toilet Upgrade



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A Short Tale of Feral Cats Part 3 Summary

• Most successful cat eradication programs require more than one control method, and are usually accomplished on islands or in protected areas behind exclusion fencing.

• Exclusion fencing, shooting and trapping are not practicable for broad scale control of cats.

• The introduction of diseases and/or immunocontraceptive agents to cat populations would be very challenging and of questionable efficacy for cat management.

• Ground set baits offer some potential for broadscale control, in certain habitats and at particular times.

• Cats are unlikely to discover and consume buried baits.

• The development of cat specific delivery methods is required to increase bait uptake by cats and decrease bait uptake by non target native species.

• Control programs for introduced rodents and rabbits should be integrated into cat control programs to avoid population explosions after cat removal.

• Control programs should also consider native species that may suffer adverse indirect effects of cat removal or management.

• Control programs should incorporate the eradication of colonies of stray cats exploiting

highly modified habitats within or close to feral cat control sites.

Although Felis catus, a feral predator, was first established on the Australian mainland with the arrival of Europeans in the last decades of the eighteenth century (Abbott 2002), it was not until 1992 that predation by feral cats was embedded in federal legislation as a Key Threatening Process in the Australian environment. During the interim, the distribution of cats increased dramatically, with records now being made regularly throughout the Australian landscape, including such diverse habitats as sandy and stony deserts, semi-arid and temperate agricultural lands, open and closed forests, woodlands, shrublands, grasslands and urban and peri-urban areas. Despite their arid origins in the near east/north African region, free-living cats also occur widely in the Australian snow country (Watson 2006).

The late recognition of predation by cats in Australia as a threatening process meant that for almost two centuries cats freely invaded almost all parts of the continent, with their dispersal assisted frequently by human agency. Cats were actively encouraged as pest control agents for rabbits, rats and mice (and to some degree still are) and consequently the distribution and abundance of cats spread from a number of introduction sites around the Australian coast. Since the European settlement of Australia, cats have also been valued as companion animals, with the national pet cat population in 1996/98 estimated at 2.65 million (Turner and Bateson 2000).

The dichotomy of the cat as pet/pest control agent versus feral pest has provided challenges for land managers attempting to control or eradicate feral cats.



Cont from page 11 Feral Cats Summary

The implementation of control methods such as the spread of disease, broad scale dissemination of toxic baits, viral vectored immunocontraception or even trapping and shooting programs have all been inhibited not only by time, labour and economic costs, but also by the weight of community expectations and the difficulties associated with targeting one subgroup of cats (ferals) while avoiding any impact on another (owned domestics).

Over the past few decades, with increased public education on the problem of predation by cats on native species, the federal government, most state governments and many local government bodies have introduced legislation requiring or encouraging stricter control of pet cats. Such legislation most usually requires the neutering, marking and confinement of pet cats, thus requiring greater responsibility by owners for the protection of their companion animals (eg Department of Local Government 1994; DNRE 1998).

There is considerable community support for such initiatives (Grayson et al 2002; Lilith et al 2006). The control of owned, domestic cats is an important aspect for the control of all cats on the Australian mainland.

Another subgroup of cats requiring urgent attention is the colony forming subgroup of cats that exploit resource rich, man made habitats in rural and suburban fringe areas. These cats possibly constitute the largest subgroup of cats in Australia. They not only exploit man made habitats, but are able to move out into surrounding habitats to exploit native species. As they live in groups in relatively small, defined habitats, ongoing removal programs would significantly reduce their abundance, and hence remove an important and ongoing source of cat re-invasion into the Australian landscape.

This recommendation should be noted

Central to the management of feral cats in Australia is the control of the owned and stray cat populations that constitute a source of cats capable of moving away from the influence of humans into relatively unmodified habitats. The distribution of cats throughout the continent, the flexibility of their social structures, and the likelihood of interactions and gene flow between owned, stray and feral cats suggest that the control and reduction of both owned and stray populations should ultimately reduce populations of feral cats.

Dog attacks on sheep

There appears to be an increase on the number of dog attacks on flocks of sheep and lambs recently in the Popanyinning area. One local farmer reported another dog attack on his sheep last weekend. That brings to a total of 15 lambs and 1 ewe killed, mauled and mostly eaten by a dog or dogs. That total does not include the loss of lambs to foxes.

If you have lost lambs/sheep to dogs, please report the incidents to the Shire of Cuballing, preferably with pictures as evidence. Farmers have a right to shoot stray dogs on their property in order to protect their stock. Please make sure that your dogs do not roam during the day or night.



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
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Cuballing War Memorial Stephen Bowes

Private Arthur Phillip McGrath

Private Arthur Phillip McGrath was larger than life. He applied to enlist at Pingelly on June 7, 1916 and when he took his medical exam at Black Boy Hill, the medical officer noted a man five feet eleven inches tall, weighing sixteen stone.

He had fair complexion, grey eyes and dark hair, and gave his religion as Church of England. His imposing stature in uniform can be judged from his portrait taken at Lafayette Studios in Perth, prior to embarkation. He was given regimental number 6111 in the 17th Reinforcements, 28th Battalion, which sailed



from Fremantle aboard HMAT Argyllshire A8 on November 9. Disembarking at Devonport, UK in January, he was marched in to Rollestone Camp, where in March, he contracted mumps. After a fortnight of treatment at Tidworth Hospital, he re-joined his unit to continue training, before sailing from Folkestone, crossing to Le Havre, France at the beginning of July, 1917.

In September, 1917, the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} Australian Divisions made a successful attack on

Menin Road Ridge, just outside of Ypres in Belgian Flanders. As part of the 2nd Division, the 7th Brigade (including the 28th Battalion) was successful in capturing German outposts in the region of Polygon wood and Hanebeek Wood. In preparation for these attacks, the 28th Battalion, hampered by darkness, rain and enemy gas shells, had taken *Cont on pg 15*

up positions on Westhoek Ridge on the night of September 19. The next morning, the 28th mounted a successful attack, and shortly after, were digging in to consolidate their gains. The action's cost in men was 51 killed, 189 wounded. Private Arthur Phillip McGrath died of wounds received in action on September 20, 1917.

His death was witnessed and reported to the Red Cross by Private N Barton at No. 3 Gen. Hospital at Le Treport on June 13, 1918:

"He was in D. Coy, a farmer in private life, from Western Australia; a man of abnormal proportions weighing probably 15 or 16 stone.

We came over together in the 17th reinforcements. He was stretcher-bearing and while carrying a case was killed by a sniper, the bullet passing through his heart. It happened on the other side of ANZAC Ridge, in a gully by Polygon Wood. He would be buried where he fell."

Arthur Phillip McGrath has no known grave today, and is commemorated on the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium, on the Narrogin War Memorial and on the Cuballing War Memorial.

And what of Arthur McGrath's farm, back in Cuballing on the Yornaning West Road? In her history 'Numbat Country', author Evelyn Roots states: "John Henry (Jack) Gard, a bachelor and blacksmith, who was wounded in the same battle as Arthur McGrath was killed, took over McGrath's land after the war and named the farm Passchendale, in memory of the place of McGrath's death."

Lest We Forget

Footnote: Private John Henry Gard had departed Fremantle aboard the Miltiades A28 with the 51st Battalion (4th Reinforcements). The Embarkation Roll shows that he was single, forty three years old, and working as a farm labourer at Cuballing. He returned safely to Australia at War's end.
