## Presidents Pen

It has been a little over 2 years since the Shire transitioned away from unmanned rubbish sites to manned waste transfer stations. At the same time, we introduced a kerbside collection service for residences in Cuballing and Popanyinning. So, how is it going?

There is no doubt the transfer station sites are far tidier and having the sites manned gives much needed organisation to sorting and recycling of waste. Managing feral animals around our waste facilities has also become much easier.

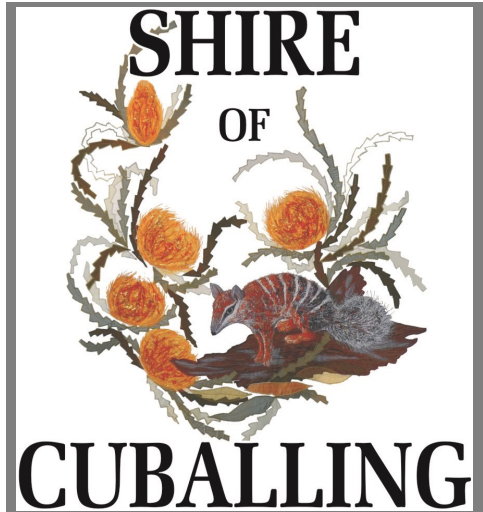
The goal in reducing the amount of waste going to land fill since changes were made, by any measure, has been an overwhelming success. Some recent data collected indicate that residents in the Cuballing Shire sent 258 tonnes to landfill annually compared to an expected 1,585 tonnes based on state averages per head of population. That is approximately 17% of the average.

There are some factors in our favour such as no industrial waste and very limited building and construction waste in our Shire but an impressive statistic non the less. Residents have embraced the recycle bins and have clearly opted into a waste avoidance approach.

State Government has been encouraging Local Governments to adopt a three-bin system known as FOGO. The intent is to have a third bin, for all Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO). One of our neighbouring Shires, Wagin, have been trialling the system with some early encouraging results in further reducing waste to landfill.

Council will consider their trial results in the new year, along with community consultation, to assess if FOGO is suitable for Cuballing and Popanyinning.

## 2019 LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS

Local government elections are held every two years, on the third Saturday in October.

Councillors are elected for four year terms, with half of the Councillors' terms concluding at each election..

Council elections are now conducted on the First Past the Post System, whereby the person with the most votes is elected - no preferences are required.

This years Council election will be held on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> October 2019.

This year there will be three (3) Councillor vacancies.

## FREE CAMPING TO BE PERMITTED AT POPANYINNING RECREATION

The Shire of Cuballing have moved to allow overnight camping on the Popanyinning Recreation Reserve for no charge. The Shire will permit free camping for one night at the Popanyinning Recreation Ground by self contained recreation vehicles in the area adjacent to the Tennis Courts. The Shire will provide not additional services at this site other than the space to park, therefore not imposing any additional cost to Council.

The Popanyinning Recreation Ground was selected because it is remote to residences, is close to local businesses in central Popanyinning and the area is not regularly used the community. Council would also like to consider a site for free camping in Cuballing but most locations are close to residences, away from local businesses or used regularly by the community.

In 2018 Council had considered other central locations to provide free camping, however camping is not permitted on the railway reserves in the centre Popanyinning and Cuballing.

## COUNCIL SHORTS

At August 2019 Ordinary Meeting of Council

1. Authorised construction of an extension to the Cuballing Fire Station that was not included in the recently adopted Council Budget. Council has been advised that estimated construction cost of \$39,272 will be matched by funding from a Department of Fire and Emergency Services Capital Grant. The extension will provide a new parking bay for a fire truck and for the widening of one of the doors to improve access by the fire truck to the existing building.
2. Approved a Special Council Meeting for 5.30pm on Monday 21<sup>st</sup> October 2019 to conduct the election of Shire President, Deputy Shire President and to appoint Councillors to Council's committees.
3. Authorised out of budget expenditure of up to \$36,203 at the Cuballing Transfer Station to complete the drainage works. This work will be funded by a transfer of funds from Councils Refuse Site Reserve of up to \$15,360 to complete the material and contract payments of the works; and
4. Authorised camping at the Popanyinning Recreation Ground and Popanyinning Old School to be organised by the Popanyinning Progress Association as part of their Popanyinning Bonfire event
5. Appointed Mr Peter Cupitt as a Fire Control Officer. Mr Cupitt has been appointed to complete regional Bushfire Risk Management programs in the Shires of Cuballing and

## CALL FOR CANDIDATE NOMINATIONS

Candidate Nominations are called for the 2019 Local Government Elections for the Shire of Cuballing.

### Who can nominate?

Any person who

- is an Australian Citizen over the age of 18 years;
  - is an elector of the district; and
  - is not disqualified under the Local Government Act 1995;
- may nominate for council.

### When to nominate

Nominations open on Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> September 2019 and close at 4.00pm sharp on Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> September 2019.

### Where to nominate

At the Shire of Cuballing Office at 22 Campbell Street, Cuballing.

### Nomination Requirements

Nominations must be on the prescribed form that is available from the Shire office.

An \$80 nomination deposit is required. You may pay your deposit in cash or by cheque, bank draft or postal order. If you make appropriate arrangements with the Returning Officer you may be able to pay your deposit by electronic transfer or other means. Nomination deposits are refunded after the election in some circumstances.

Candidates are required to provide a profile of the candidate consisting of no more than 150 words. Your nomination must include your name, address and contact numbers. The profile must be confined to information about you. It may include a recent passport size photo of your head or head and shoulders. The profile must be or be capable of being printed on a single A4 page.

If you are unable to personally attend to nominate, an authorised agent can do this on your behalf.

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# 2017/18 AUDIT ACTION PLAN

Council has responded to the Minister of Local Government regarding adverse trends of Council's Asset Sustainability Ratio and Operating Surplus Ratio raised in Council's 2017/18 Audit Report

Financial ratios are designed to provide users of local government annual financial reports with a clearer interpretation of the performance and financial results of a local government and a comparison of trends over a number of years.

The Shire of Cuballing's performance in relation to all financial ratios can be viewed at the MyCouncil website at <https://www.mycouncil.wa.gov.au/>

The Shire of Cuballing's recent ratios are:

Ratio	2018	2017	2016
Asset sustainability	0.48	0.77	0.80
Operating surplus	(0.84)	(0.12)	(0.95)

The Shire of Cuballing has only met compliance with the Operating Surplus Ratio once in this six years. The Shire of Cuballing has not met compliance with the Asset Sustainability Ratio for the last three years.

This Operating Surplus Ratio is a measure of a local government's ability to cover its operational costs and have revenues available for capital funding or other purposes. The ratio is calculated by dividing Operating Revenue less Operating Expense, divided by Own Source Operating Revenue

The Asset Sustainability Ratio is an approximation of the extent to which assets managed by a local government are being replaced as these reach the end of their useful lives. The ratio is calculated by measuring capital expenditure on renewal or replacement of assets, relative to depreciation expense. Expenditure on new or additional assets is excluded

The Office of the Auditor General in their *Audit Results Report – Annual 2017 -18 Financial Audits of Local Government Entities* from 15 March 2019 advises that in relation to:

## Operating Surplus Ratio

- 5 of 135 local governments exceeded the DLGSC benchmark of 0.15;
- 21 of 135 local governments met the basic benchmark of between 0.01 and 0.15; and
- 109 of 135 local governments below the benchmark of 0.01. The Shire of Cuballing was one of these Councils.

## Asset Sustainability Ratio

- 36 of 135 local governments exceeded the DLGSC benchmark of 0.15;
- 18 of 135 local governments met the basic benchmark of between 0.9 and 1.1; and
- 81 of 135 local governments were below the benchmark of 0.9. The Shire of Cuballing was one of these Councils.

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# THE MCGARRIGALS OF POPANYINNING

Popanyinning is a small town on the Great Southern Railway and the Great Southern Highway, a town in which links to its past are everywhere. And in Popanyinning, McGarrigal is a well-known surname. Indeed, as a name it has numerous references in the book 'Numbat Country' (E. Roots). Here is but one: "When Cecil John and Annie McGarrigal took over the shop and purchased the building from Mr Dowling in 1940 they began a 46-year period of service to Popanyinning by the McGarrigal family". The other references in Numbat Country serve to emphasize that the McGarrigals' involvement and service extended into all aspects of the life of the town.

Less well known is the service in the 1914-18 Great War of two McGarrigal brothers, who enlisted in another district. As a result, they are not acknowledged on the Great War Rolls of Honour for Cuballing, Popanyinning and Yornaning. Cecil John 'Snowy' McGarrigal and his brother Rupert James 'Jim' McGarrigle are honoured on the Narrogin War Memorial as having served their King, Country and Empire.

Rupert James McGarrigle (sic) was born in 1891 in Bowan Park, near Orange NSW, though in his enlistment documents, he states it was Sydney. Dr DWH Mackie accepted his application to enlist in the AIF in Narrogin on August 10, 1915 and performed a preliminary medical examination, reporting the applicant to be twenty-one years and six months old, just under five feet seven inches tall. His enlistment application was completed on the last day of August at Blackboy Hill, where the medical noted that he had blue eyes, brown hair, a ruddy complexion and he weighed one hundred and thirty two pounds. He was appointed to the 12th Reinforcements, 10th Light Horse Regiment with regimental number 1631 and sailed from Fremantle aboard the Royal Mail Steamer Mongolia on November 22. The Embarkation Roll states that James was single, a farm hand at 14 Mile Brook, and that his next of kin (J Caldwell) lived at the same address. He was known to his friends as 'Jim'.

On January 5, 1916 in Cairo, Jim transferred to the Army Service Corps, but he was hospitalized at Heliopolis from February 16 to 23 with pyrexia. After discharge from hospital, he resumed duties in Egypt and was moved again to the Signals Squadron of the Australian Mounted Division. He joined his unit on active service at Romani on March 28, 1916.

On October 2, 1917 Jim was injured in an accident in which he upset a Dixie of boiling water, which necessitated a 'Report on Accidental or Self-Inflicted Injuries'. He was treated by the 2nd Light Horse Field Ambulance before transfer to Number 45 Stationery Hospital at El Arish. James spent some months in hospital at Abbassia and Montazah. He was discharged to the Signal Training Unit at Moascar at the end of January, 1918, and then attached to the Cable Section at Alexandria. Finally, he was taken on strength of the 2nd Signal Squadron July 9, 1918 in the field. All blame for the accident was dispelled by an officer witness statement: "McGarrigle was lifting some boiling water from the fire when he lost his balance and overturned the water on himself. The occurrence, as far as I could see, was purely accidental."

Jim McGarrigle embarked at Cairo to return to Australia on July 26, 1919 as a Driver with the 2nd Signal Squadron, Australian Mounted Division, disembarking on West Australian soil again on August 22, 1919. His service was recognised by the awarding of the 1914-15 Star, British War Medal and the Victory Medal. Jim McGarrigle was an athlete and accomplished runner in his post-war life. He outlived his wife, Ada Amy (Dewar) by fifteen years and died in December 1970 at Lemnos Hospital, Shenton Park at the age of seventy-nine.

Rupert James McGarrigle's younger brother, Cecil John McGarrigal (sic) was born in Werris Creek, NSW on April 12, 1893. His enlistment papers give his place of birth as Sydney, and his address as Pinjarra. He was single, a labourer and nineteen years and six months old when he presented to Medical Officer James B Lewis in Narrogin. He was just under five feet six inches tall, one hundred and forty-four pounds, with fair complexion, blue eyes and light hair. The latter accounts for his nickname 'Snowy'. He had a burn scar on his right shoulder. He was single and gave his father James McGarrigal of Northam as his next of kin. Snowy took his Oath of Allegiance before Narrogin Town Clerk Langman Johns, standing in for the Mayor, Michael Brown on October 20, 1914.

The 10th Light Horse Regiment in training at Claremont was under Commanding Officer Noel Brazier, who appointed Cecil to the reinforcement detail for his regiment as Trooper 618. Cecil John McGarrigal sailed from Fremantle with the 1st Reinforcements, 10th ALHR aboard HMAT A52 Surada on February 17, 1915. Also aboard were C Squadron personnel and horses under Major JB Scott, plus reinforcement details 1 to 14. The Surada docked at Suez on the 22nd of April, and the troops disgorged from her marched in to Mena camp the following day. The regiment sailed from Alexandria on May 16 on the captured North German Lloyd steamer Lutzow bound for Gallipoli.

On August 29, Trooper McGarrigal was wounded during the fighting for Hill 60. He was transferred to Mudros with a gunshot wound to the arm, and then evacuated to England, where he spent time in the Military Hospital Church Lane, in Tooting, Surrey. Being determined to make the most of this opportunity, Snowy followed a path all too common for the men of the AIF in British hospitals at the time. He absented himself without leave for over one month, from February 4 until March 12. When he reported back to military authorities, he was put into detention for twenty eight days, with forfeiture of thirty eight days pay and seven shillings expenses. This was the first of several run-ins with authority. He was re-admitted to hospital, this time to Bulford General Hospital and discharged on June 13. Eight days later, he went AWL again in London, before presenting himself for discipline (forfeiture of six days pay). On July 24, 1916 he re-joined Light Horse Details at Park House, where he was in trouble again: "1. Conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline in that he did create a disturbance by using obscene language 2. Resisting arrest" (Ninety-six hours detention, four days' pay).

On September 9, 1916 Trooper McGarrigal became Private McGarrigal of the 32nd Infantry Battalion. He embarked for France on September 16 and was marched in to Etaples the next day, before joining his new battalion in the field on the last day of September. In mid-November, he was admitted to the 25th Stationary Hospital at Rouen with mumps, returning to his battalion five days before Christmas. 1917 was to be the year for self-improvement for Private McGarrigal. He started by joining 1st ANZAC Bomb School on New Year's Eve, though this did not end as badly as it could have. He was then promoted to Lance Corporal at the end of March and undertook Gas School for



five days in June and a further Bombing Course at the ANZAC School in August. On December 19, Snowy was again in trouble, this time for "Conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline in that he was in a billet without permission" (Reprimanded by the CO 32nd Battalion).

1918 started well for Snowy with ten days leave in Paris in January. He re-joined the 32nd for February and, promoted to Corporal and was then sent to Codford, in England to attend Anti Gas School at Chiseldon in mid-March. With his experience, skills and new qualifications, Corporal McGarrigal was retained in 14 Training Battalion in England until September 1, when he proceeded overseas to France once again via Folkestone and Le Havre. He re-joined the 32nd Battalion in the field on September 7, 1918. He was again reprimanded by the CO 32nd Battalion for "Absence from 1845 Parade"

Following the Armistice, Corporal McGarrigal was granted furlough in France before being listed as an early draftee for return to Australia as "1915 personnel". He returned to Australia on the Hospital Transport Burma, disembarked to the 5th Military District on January 22, 1919.

Corporal Cecil John McGarrigal's service was recognised by the awarding of the 1914-15 Star, British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

The McGarrigal Family History records the following:

"Cecil ("Snowy") McGarrigal will be remembered by many people as the man who ran the Popanyinning store from about 1939 until his death in 1947 at the age of 52. Snowy had been a labourer in Narrogin before enlisting in October 1914 and serving at ANZAC with the 10th Light Horse. He went to France with the 32nd Battalion and in 1917 was lance-corporal in charge of a ten-man bomber team, No 7 Platoon Bombers, which consisted mostly of men from South Australia. The pencilled notes in the pocketbook Snowy used in the trenches and brought back with him bring home the stark reality of the war- names of the men and their individual roles, copious details of grenades and bombs and explosives, how to survive gas attacks...Snowy returned badly wounded- gassed, shell-shocked and with shrapnel embedded in his right shoulder. In 1920 Lt-Col Olden had occasion to state publicly that he was "a gallant soldier whose conduct at all times was a splendid example to his comrades." "Cecil married Annie (Nugent) in August 1920. Annie outlived Cecil by nearly forty years and died at Narrogin in May 1987 at the age of ninety one.

The author would like to acknowledge the help afforded him in writing these biographical stories by Val Watts (nee McGarrigal) and Dulcie McGarrigal, who were generous in sharing their family history. Thank you, Val and Dulcie.
